Moving to make our paddocks ready for a changing climate - Presented by Kathryn Mcguirk (Yass Area Network)

YAN started a "Climate Ready" project in 2018. We planted several trial sites with Eucalyptus, acacia and regional hop bush in 2020 and have been monitoring their survival rates since that time. Since 2020 we have been sourcing native seed for 40 species from Box Gum Grassy woodland plants we expect to thrive in the Yass region to 2050. We are working with NSW Adapt, Macquarie University and Royal Botanical Gardens.

Caring for Southern Pygmy Perch in the Gunning region - Presented by Sonya Duus (Gunning District Landcare)

Gunning District Landcare has had a long-term interest in the endangered Southern Pygmy Perch that have been found in local waterways. We run activities to engage the community and improve habitat, working closely with fish scientists. Most recently we have formed a partnership with Oz Fish Unlimited.

Superb Parrot - A study in biodiversity - Presented by Vincent Heffernan (Upper Lachlan Landcare)

OEH launched an initiative to plant 'paddock' trees in the hope of providing potential nesting places for the increasingly marginalised Superb Parrot. However the deeper understanding of the threat these birds face means we require a broader and more nuanced effort. Preventing loss of existing trees is vital. Bringing balance in ecosystems so trees aren't lost due to stress or too many mistletoes. Providing food for the SP's is equally important. This may seem like a story of a parrot and a tree but goes to the complexity and integration of the entire ecosystem and our role in that as landholders and farmers. **Contact** - vince heffernan@hotmail.com

Supporting Endangered frogs and reptiles in the Shoalhaven - Presented by Greg Thompson (Shoalhaven Landcare)

Araluen Creek Restoration Project - Presented by Penny Hayman (Upper Deua Catchment Landcare Group)

The Araluen Creek Restoration Project is to undertake additional works to rehabilitate the Araluen Creek, from the effect of the drought, bushfires and flooding over recent years. Fundamental to the project has been partnership with landholders along the creek to obtain cooperation and collaboration. A major part of the project involves large-scale erosion control works along the creek. However, vitally important are other activities such as weed control, re-vegetation, fencing, low-cost small erosion control measures, alternative water sources for stock and ongoing creek monitoring. A community engagement program has been run over the last year on each of these aspects.

The Regional Circularity Cooperative (RCC) - Presented by Andrew Taylor (Bega Group)

The Regional Circularity Cooperative (RCC) has been established by Bega Group (aka Bega Cheese) to drive a transition to a circular economy in the Bega region, demonstrating how working together can drive a whole-of-community / whole of economy transition to circular economy. This transition requires a comprehensive and collaborative approach that works with economic, social, cultural and environmental drivers at numerous scales. The RCC is working with community, industry, academia, government and corporates on local, regional, national and international scales and is excited by the progress so far. Bega Valley will serve as an ideal pilot for establishing a scalable model to encourage adoption more broadly.

Local Land Stewards - Incentivising Better Land Manager Environmental Practices - Presented by Melissa Henry (Local Land Services)

Local Land Stewards has been a four-year project to work with 24 landholders in Boorowa, Upper Lachlan and Yass Valley to increase groundcover, herbage mass, pasture species diversity and perennially, having installed paddock sub-divisional fencing and additional water points. Landholders have also been participating in Landcare peer-supported grazing groups to increase their skills in time-controlled grazing and pasture monitoring.

This Goes with That? – Symbiotic Agriculture - Presented by Julia McKay (Landcare Goulburn Mulwaree)

Landscape management is not simple and no one system fits all circumstances. Similarly nature isn't simple. Mixes of vegetation and animals (especially our own species) cause responses over time via the process of selection – selecting for success and eliminating failures. Landcare Goulburn Mulwaree has supported a multi-species pasture trial at Parksbourne to assess the impact of a polyculture on soil health, productivity and productivity. This is a work in progress.

Saving Our Creek - One Farm's Journey - Presented by Frank Egan (Upper Shoalhaven Landcare Council)

One farm's journey to repair an 800-meter section of a local creek that traverses the property. Over the course of 15 years, we observe how the landscape changes and responds to human intervention and riparian management. The story highlights an innovative approach to creek restoration that focuses on creating structures that discharge water at a slower rate and capture debris, allowing the creek to function properly. It's an excellent example of how a little creativity can go a long way in addressing environmental issues.
